## Standing with Children & Families during COVID-19

While its impact is universal, there is widespread evidence to show that the COVID-19 pandemic is hitting the most vulnerable among us the hardest. For children who have experienced abuse or neglect or for those who are at-risk of maltreatment, social isolation and economic uncertainty brought on by COVID-19 has had far-reaching consequences. This includes the disruption of support networks, the suspension of critically important services and foster homes in short supply. For children and families inching closer to reunification and those working to avoid removal altogether, many are facing new obstacles like unemployment and homelessness.

At this unprecedented time, court appointed special advocate (CASA) and guardian ad litem (GAL) volunteers have been a critical lifeline for children and families. Having a caring, consistent adult—someone who checks in, follows up, holds the system accountable and puts the child's best interests before all others'—can make all the difference and help change a child's story.
